Visual communications preliminary assignment: Thumbnails and sketching for a process book

A process book explains the development of ideas that lead to your final design. Process books are usually used to communicate where a design came from. Process books should tell a coherent story illustrating the process that led to a final design.

The process book should contain: "Field" research, notes, and visual reference to a project's product or idea, inspiration, scans, print-outs, swatches (color story), fonts, sketches and thumbnails, full color (half letter sized) concept drawing, and anything else that relates to the project. Conceptually, the book should also show a strong relationship to the finished product.

· We make process books at the start of every project. But today I just want you to sketch.

Sketching and Thumbnails Assignment

Rather than making you do an entire process book now, let's just do a part.

Juniors were designing a cereal box, but the twist is it's for a creature. They've had to develop what the creature looks like, what it eats, and where it lives.

- For this assignment I want you to draw at least twenty thumbnails of the creature you would design for the cereal box assignment.
- Make some additional sketches of what it eats and where it lives.

You can make notes and show pictures of what inspired your creature too if you want. For example, is it based off of a bug? You can print out the picture of the bug and glue it on the paper too.

You can use loose paper and clip it all together or work in a sketchbook.

Make sure your name is on everything and this paper is attached.

- Note that thumbnails can be loose and quick.
- Sketches should be bigger and show more detail.

If you want to see a process book, stop by VisComm during reading period or ask a graphics kid to show you one of their's.

Thumbnails can be this size
